### Senator Jon Kyl of Arizona



Jon Kyl was elected to the U.S. Senate from Arizona in 1994 and re-elected in 2000 and 2006, after having served four terms in the U.S. House of Representatives. He serves on the Senate Finance Committee, where he is the ranking Republican on the Subcommittee on Taxation and IRS Oversight, and on the Judiciary Committee, where he is the ranking Republican on the Subcommittee on Terrorism, Technology, and Homeland Security. As chairman of the Senate Republican Conference, he directs the communications operations of Senate Republicans and is the third-ranking member of the Republican Leadership. Among recent accomplishments and legislative efforts, Kyl has:

- —Led efforts to increase funding for border security and to reimburse states for the cost of providing federally mandated health care to undocumented immigrants and incarcerating criminal aliens;
- —Served as the driving force behind the landmark Arizona Water Settlements Act;
- —Won passage of legislation to establish the Ecological Restoration Institute at Northern Arizona University, and to expand Arizona's Petrified Forest National Park;
- -Won passage of a historic bill guaranteeing the rights of crime victims; and
- —Successfully fought for strong anti-terrorism tools for law enforcement,
  Including the "Lone-Wolf Fix" to the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance
  Act.

Before his public service, Kyl practiced law at Jennings, Strouss & Salmon in Phoenix. In 1985 he served as chairman of the Phoenix Chamber of Commerce. Born in Oakland, Nebraska, Kyl received both his bachelor's and law degrees from the University of Arizona. He graduated Phi Beta Kappa and was editor-in-chief of the Arizona Law Review. He and his wife Caryll have two children, Kristine Kyl Gavin and John Kyl, and four grandchildren.

#### Dear Friends,

Since the earliest days of aviation, airmen at Davis-Monthan and the citizens of Tucson have shared a common bond of friendship and service. During the last 80 years we have grown strong together, and share a tremendous sense of optimism in the future.

In 1919 city leaders devoted acreage to create the first-ever city owned municipal airfield in the nation. That land is now part of Davis-Monthan Air Force Base. Davis-Monthan was formally opened on September 23, 1927. Charles Lindbergh, fresh from his non-stop crossing of the Atlantic Ocean, flew his "Spirit of St. Louis" to Tucson to dedicate Davis-Monthan Municipal. The airport was named in honor of Lieutenants Samuel H. Davis and Oscar Monthan. Davis and Monthan were two of Tucson's very own sons. They were also World War I-era pilots. Sadly, both of these officers died in military aircraft accidents.

During World War II Davis-Monthan was home to the B-24 "Liberator" bomber and an enormous flying training program. This program helped ensure that American airpower prevailed in Europe and the Pacific. Airmen, by the tens of thousands trained at Davis-Monthan during the world war, and after achieving victory many returned to Tucson to live. The families of these airmen populate Tucson today in great numbers.

Immediately following World War II, Strategic Air Command began operations at Davis-Monthan. America's first jet bomber, the B-47 Stratojet, was based here throughout the 1950's. These aircraft were constantly "On Alert" for possible war against the Soviet Union. Later, Davis-Monthan became home to several Titan-II intercontinental ballistic missiles. Ultimately the deterrence provided by these forces ensured our country remained

As early as 1953 Davis-Monthan AFB was home to jet fighter aircraft as pilots trained in the F-86, the F-100, and beginning in 1964, the world-famous F-4 Phantom. Many of the pilots who served in Korea and Vietnam trained at Davis-Monthan AFB, making our Air Force the greatest in the world.

In 1971 the 355th Fighter Wing transferred to Davis-Monthan AFB, and the men and women of Davis-Monthan continued to deploy to Southeast Asia until 1974. Initially equipped with the A-7D, the 355th FW transitioned to the A-10 Thunderbolt II in 1976. By the end of the decade, with the phase-out of the A-7, the 355th Fighter Wing became the Air Force's largest A-10 unit.


As Davis-Monthan entered the 1990s, it continued to train A-10 fighter pilots for assignments to units in the United States, England and Korea. D-M eventually became home to EC-130's and HH-60 rescue helicopters. Moreover, D-M is also home to HQ 12th Air Force.

Just as Tucson has grown in significance as a forward thinking western city, Davis-Monthan has grown to become one of Air Combat Command's premiere Air Force bases. We share a common vision of hope for the future! The same sense of service to nation reflected by Tucson's early citizens Samuel Davis and Oscar Monthan continues as over 1000 of your Airmen are deployed around the world today defending America!

Tonight we celebrate the 60th birthday of our Air Force, and the 80th birthday of Davis-Monthan. Thank you for sharing this important evening with your Airmen. May the bonds of friendship continue to keep us strong.





### 60th USAF and 80th D-M Anniversary Logo

The 60th USAF and 80th D-M Anniversary logo was created by Airmen from across Davis-Monthan AFB. The design is rich with symbolism. Most importantly, it is a reminder of the close relationship shared by the Airmen at D-M and the citizens of our host city, Tucson.



The front of the emblem symbolizes our Air Force heritage at Davis-Monthan AFB. The HAP Arnold wings speak of the beginnings of American Airpower and the crucial role the base played in its establishment. In 1927, Charles Lindbergh landed here to dedicate the airfield with his Spirit of St. Louis; 80 years later we have grown into a strong combat team, with thousands of our Airmen stationed around the globe. As the skyward contrails of the Air Force Memorial attest, our progress is ever increasing thanks to the service, ultimate sacrifice and support of our Airmen and Citizens.

The back of the emblem commemorates the close relationship Davis-Monthan and the City of Tucson have maintained since 1927. The city's support enabled critical B-24 Liberator training, providing the capability to send Airmen to every theater of combat in World War II. This is still the case today, as the City of Tucson's unending support provides the capability to train and deploy Airmen world-wide to project airpower in the Global War on Terror.

The seven stars in front of the B-24 represent the seven wars and campaigns that DM has directly supported: WWII, Korea, Viet Nam, Cold War, Gulf War I, Gulf War II, and Afghanistan.
