GREAT STORES OF GAS AND OIL ARE MENAGED BY FIRE

Butte, Sept. 23.—Approximately 200,000 gallons of oil and gasoline and other property, worth more than \$50,000, of the Bluebird Refining company's plant near the Butte-Anaconda highway, one mile west of Butte, were endangered when fire of an unknown origin razed a barn and an unattended house within 50 feet of the oil tanks last night.

Wealth and Fame Denied Roundup Baby by a Judge

Shelby, Sept. 23.—A 20-year-old boy, who gives his name as Harry Cowan, and his address as Spokane, was taken into custody and lodged in the city jail overnight, on receipt by Chief of Police Alsop of advices from Lothair, to hold the boy until his father reached here. He had been bruised about the head when he fell off a horse near Lothair, where he had been working and was wandering about in a dazed condition when picked up here.

LITTLE BOY DROWNS IN WATERING TANK

Chinook, Sept. 23.—Little Glenn Dawson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Dawson of the Fairview settlement south of Chinook, was drowned in a tub of water in the yard at the family home. The little boy was but two years and three months of age. He was playing about the place and his father had seen him but a few minutes before his death was discovered.

NEMESIS OF LAW HAS SENT CLARK TO ROPE

San Quentin, Calif., Sept. 23.—(AP)—Earl J. Clark, convicted of murdering Charles Silva, San Pedro sailor, in April, 1925, was hanged here today. The trap was sprung at 10-01 and Clark was pronounced dead 12 minutes later.

DELAY SEARCH FOR MISSING AIRPLANE

Glendale, Calif., Sept. 23.—(AP)—The start of an airplane search by Roy Wilson and Bob Starkey for the plane "Spirit of Hollywood" was postponed today due to lateness of the hour, after the two pilots had provisioned their plane and warmed up the motor. "The Spirit of Hollywood," bearing Marion Mack of the movies and piloted by Captain Frank Tommick, army air corps reserve officer, has been reported missing since it left Clover Field, Santa Monica, Wednesday morning for Chicago. It failed to arrive in Salt Lake City, its scheduled first stop and no report of its whereabouts has been made.

Mother Remains Blank Since Killing Her Baby

St. Ignatius, Sept. 23.—Maggie Brooks, who is held by authorities here on the charge of having thrown her baby out the window of the Northern Pacific train, is a patient at the Holy Family hospital, her mind apparently almost a blank. The case is one that has aroused the deepest sympathy. The girl has been, according to a statement of the attending physician, almost a blank and registers like that of about an 8-year-old child. She is very docile and answers questions readily, but her mind hardly functions beyond that, it is said.

AL SMITH BACKED FOR PRESIDENT

Miles City, Sept. 23.—Lieutenant Gene Eubank flew in from Spokane at 1 o'clock today and stopped on the landing field to take on oil and gas. He was on his way to Wright field, Dayton, Ohio, where the death of his father-in-law, Col. William Kelley, well known in the west among army men, was calling him. He left Spokane at 8 o'clock Miles City time. His intention when he took off here at 1:30 was to make Aberdeen today, and, if possible, St. Paul.
